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The challenges and long-term difference the LeDeR programme can make in 2019-2020

Professor Pauline Heslop, the LeDeR programme lead at the University of Bristol, has recorded a short Q&A video to mark this year's Learning Disability Week (June 17-21). In case you missed it: LeDeR annual report and NHS England's Action from Learning report

The LeDeR programme's 2018 annual report was published on May 21st. It's available here to download. NHS England also published its accompanying Learning from Action report on the same day. The next 12 months will see NHS England invest a further £5 million to make sure reviews of deaths are completed within six months of notification. There will also be an increase in transparency, with local reports to NHS public board meetings and greater detail published at a national level about each area's performance in completing reviews.

New pop-up messages in LeDeR Review System

New pop-up messages are now operational in the online LeDeR Review System. Important messages for reviewers, local area contacts and regional coordinators will appear on screen when users log in. System users will be required to tick a box to say they have received and read the message before they can access the rest of the LeDeR Review System. These on-screen messages will be used from now on to communicate updates and changes to users, instead of being sent by email.
