

Learning Disabilities Mortality Review (LeDeR) programme

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LeDeR and intellectual disabilities research

The LeDeR team discuss the findings from the LeDeR reviews of deaths from sudden unexpected death in epilepsy (SUDEP) in a forthcoming issue of Epilepsy Professional magazine.

Our 2020 annual report found that epilepsy is the second most frequently reported potentially treatable cause of death in people with learning disabilities.

The forthcoming paper aims to redress the under-representation of people with intellectual disabilities in epilepsy research. We have found:

- missed opportunities to improve epilepsy related care, particularly in relation to medication
- a need to return to basic safety measures such as up-to-date care plans and assessments, and access to an epilepsy nurse between appointments.

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Update on new LeDeR web based platform

SCW (South, Central and West Commissioning Support Unit) continue the work on the new web-based platform for the LeDeR programme. SCW have completed the Discovery phase of the project, and are now working through the alpha phase. This is where features and ideas from the discovery phase are being tested to confirm the technology that will be part of the new platform. This will include the key functionality that users have identified as important and they are seeking. The new platform will be live by June 2021.
