


 Original aims to improve key hospital based public health issues and embed a public health ethos throughout the Trust

 $\odot$  Partnership began in 2021/22 with four key project areas for focus:

- Maternity and equity
- Tobacco dependency (acute inpatient and maternity)
- Perioperative medicine
- Staff health checks



## Maternity Equity - Project Aim



To improve access to maternity services for women and birthing people, and their families, in the Berkshire West area

- Appreciative Inquiry methodology and Asset Based Community Development to explore the needs of the population and design services aiming for equity
- Explored all maternity areas families seeking sanctuary became the focus due to them being a vulnerable group most likely to experience the poorest maternity outcomes.
  - Conducted focus groups with key stakeholders including midwives, local community assets
- Identified needs of this population, barriers to care and additional services that could improve care and increase equity







 Creates a one stop shop environment for women and birthing people seeking sanctuary and their families

 Offers a range of clinical and social support in one place that will aim to address the health and social needs

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**OBuilds** trust and confidence in health services

 Uses local and national data to ensure that appropriate services are provided for the best outcomes







 Provide non-biased people centred care personalised to their ethnicity, culture and general needs

OExpand care provided to be inclusive of their wider family

 Address serious case review results linking worse outcomes for babies of fathers with poor antenatal care and education engagement

 Create a safe space for sensitive conversations allowing women, birthing people and families to build trust in midwives and services







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 $\circ$  Four clinics have taken place so far at the Sun Street Children's Centre in central Reading

 $\circ$  Clinics run alternate months – July 2022, through to at least July 2023 and beyond

 Barriers broken down for these families (bespoke space, transport, children and partners can attend, all language needs catered to, resources for the children)

 Women and birthing people and their families able to engage with a number of clinical services and professionals in one place

 $\circ$  Provided with essentials for baby arrival such as birthing bags donated by The Cowshed

- Antenatal education for all women and birthing people
- Partners/Dad's education and psychological safety

- 52 families come through the clinic space with some families attending all four sessions (January 2022)
- Countries of origin (Predominantly Afganistan, Syria, Ukraine)
- Languages spoken (Pashto, Farsi, Ukrainian, Russian, Tigrenia, Dari, Spanish, French – Current most commonly spoken languages in maternity - Romanian, Polish, Urdu, Arabic and Bulgarian)
- Serious maternity related issues detected that would've gone unseen (Reduced fetal movements, abdominal pain, chest pain, safeguarding)
- Other health issues (i.e sexual health, mental health)
- Helping address wider social issues addressed (i.e housing, developing friendships and reducing isolation, food)





## How families are engaged with...



 Poppy Team at the RBFT – provide enhanced care for vulnerable families in maternity e.g. safeguarding, mental health, seeking sanctuary, domestic abuse.

 All families seeking sanctuary are referred to the care of the Poppy Team and they already provide their routine antenatal care – families are referred by the Poppy midwives to the clinic. Finding it helps having the existing trusting relationship in place.

 We have developed relationships with Reading Refugee Support as a result of this work. If an expectant family or new postnatal family comes into the area they can directly refer into the Poppy Team and we can support them to navigate the system.
